Taking part is your choice. We want to tell you more about the UCAN project. We want you to understand what you will be asked to do.

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






We are looking for people to take part. If you have a learning disability you can take part.

Why are we doing the project?

The UCAN project is working with people with a learning disability. Together we will create (co-produce) a tool. A tool is a way to make things easier.

We want the tool to help make it easier to get access to urgent and emergency care such as 999 or the doctor during the night-time.

Why are group chats (focus groups) needed?

A group chat (focus group) is a way of working together.

It lets us listen and talk about our experiences.











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A group chat (focus group) helps us work out together what can help people with learning disabilities.

We want to make a new tool that can make things easier. We want to help make it easier to get access to urgent and emergency care such as 999 or the doctor during the night-time.

Why have I been asked to take part?

We are looking for people to take part our group chats (focus groups). If you have a learning disability you can take part. We are looking for people who can talk about their experiences. We want to work together in the group chats (focus groups) to make a way to make things easier (a new tool).

Do I have to take part?

No. Taking part is your choice. It is up to you to decide.











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What will happen to me if I take part?

We will need some information such as your email address or phone number. This is so that we can get in touch.

We want to collect important information (data). We will ask everyone who is taking part some questions.


We will need your name and email address or phone number (contact details) so we can get in touch. We will ask you for some other information about you such as your age.

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Will my information (data) be kept safe (confidential)?

If you take part, we will ask you for some personal information. For example, we will ask your name and email address or phone number (contact details).

What good things might happen if I take part?

With your help, we can make a new tool (a way to make things easier). It will help people use urgent and emergency care services such as 999 or the doctor during the night-time.

Are there any negatives to taking part?

Sometimes it can be difficult to work together. Talking in a group can be tricky.


We will record the group chats (focus groups). We

will save anything we create together.










will be able to use it anymore.



All important personal information (data) will be kept safe. Keele University has rules that we must follow. These are called the data <u>retention schedule</u> and <u>policy</u>.















This is called a transcript.


